FIRST READING: Wisdom 7:7-11 (143B) SECOND READING: Hebrews 4:12-13 GOSPEL: Mark 10:17-30

Because You Asked...

Q: A parishioner shared that they were distraught about the behavior of their children and grandchildren, who despite having been raised in the faith have "fallen through the cracks". Their question is, "Would you expand on Ezekiel 18 and how it relates to Church law in bringing up our children in the Catholic faith? Other parents are concerned about what the Church has to offer for these 'lost sheep.' (And yes, I have prayed for the intercession of Saint Monica as well as relatives who have passed on)."

In Ezekiel 18:2 we hear a proverb from the pop culture of the day back in ancient Israel. The proverb stated that, "Parents eat sour grapes but the children's teeth are set on edge." The pessimistic meaning here is that it was broadly thought that people suffered because of the sins of their parents or ancestors. Even the apostles, centuries later, were not immune to this error of thinking. For instance, in John 9:2 they ask Jesus whether it was the sin of the blind man or the sin of his parents that had caused his blindness. And people routinely pronounced curses on others up to the nth generation for added emphasis. But here Ezekiel passes on some game changing wisdom to the people that was actually quite pioneering for its day. God says to Ezekiel, "Only the one who sins shall die. The son shall not be charged with the guilt of the father, nor shall the father be charged with the guilt of the son. Justice belongs to the just and wickedness to the wicked." In other words, God is teaching the Chosen People about personal accountability. As it applies to this parishioner's question, a parent shares responsibility in the bad conduct of their minor children only to the extent that they are called by the Church to be their child's first and best teacher. If they set a bad example or fail to teach right from wrong at all they

share in at least a portion of the moral culpability for the sins of their children. However, when a child has reached the age of reason where they have the ability to know right from wrong (the Church says generally by age seven), and especially as an adult, they are responsible for their own sinful choices. This is an insufficient answer, though, in my view, if a person was simply looking for a way to wash their hands of moral responsibility because Ezekiel also has this to say in Ez. 25:17, "Blessed is he who in the name of charity and good will shepherds the weak through the vallev of darkness for he is truly his brother's keeper and the finder of lost children." And again in Ez. 3:18 Ezekiel informs us that if we see our brother sinning and we say nothing or do nothing to deter them then we share in their sin. The full answer lies between these two poles. Your children will have to answer for all of their own choices as will you as a parent or grandparent but this is also true...in eternity you will always be the parent of your children and the grandparent of your grandchildren. There are two earthly vocations that we believe will ring out in eternity. A priest is a priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek. And a parent is also a parent forever. Along with God you have been a coworker in creating a life that has an eternal soul. There is a moral responsibility (and a blessing too) with bringing this kind of new life into the world. At a minimum it means continuing to pray for them and trying to love them as best you can now and forever. You are not in this alone though. Your extended adopted family is the Church. Our job is to evangelize and to leave the ninety-nine in search of the one lost sheep. Our parish has programs like Welcome Home Catholic and RCIA to help with outreach. In the mean time, never give up hope and never give up praying for them or reaching out to them in love.

In order to welcome our neighbors we must know that we ourselves are welcome. We are each children of God, loved in every way, made perfect by him. And so it is that each person we meet, regardless of their journey, is perfect in God's eyes too. We must stop searching for purpose and become purposeful - for we are not alone here.

Sacred Traditions and Catechesis in the Domestic Church (Part 1)

When you think about your own family, chances are one of the first words to come to mind isn't *church*. Still, we know that our families, as the first and most basic communities of faith, are the key to our growth in faith. Our faith, or at least the roots of our faith, is a home-made "product". In a sense, the home is the "lab" where we live out what we learned in church and in catechical settings. So one implication for our Children's' Ministry program is to respect what God has already begun in our students' lives, and to ask students' about their experiences when appropriate. God is already at work in the domestic churches—the families of the children in our Religious Education program - and so we pray for not only the children in our program but also their families.

To introduce the concept of the domestic church, I often ask groups: "What has been the most important influence on your faith? (When the participants are adults, it's often interesting to ask them to answer this question focusing on their childhood, and then on their adolescence, and then on their adult experience). People often name some powerful traditions in their own family, their domestic church. The word *tradition* implies the handing over (or across generations) of certain practices for safekeeping, although each generation invents its own traditions as well. Our traditions are those ways in which we mark what is important to us, including our faith. For example, there are certain times and experiences we consider "holy ground" – just as Moses was told to take off his shoes as he approached the burning bush because it was holy ground.

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Traditions in our families mark the holy times that happen every day – such as nightly prayers, meals together, or a blessing by parents just before bed or heading out for the day's school or work. The tradition of nightly blessing is something I often encourage new and not-so-new parents to adopt. There is something comforting and naturally reflective about being tucked in that reminds us of God's love and a parent's love at the same time. Holy indeed.

No tradition is more familiar than the family's daily mealtime. In addition to grace before the meal, there are plenty of potential traditions associated with a family eating a meal together. Some families light a candle to remind them that Christ is the light of the world and is present when they come together. Other families have each person share the high point and low point of the day. When some of the children come to our Religious Education program they may not have had these experiences so it is important when we give snacks in our classes to at least give them a "taste" of prayer before and after a meal.

Besides the daily holy times, there are many times of the year that offer opportunities for traditions. For example, many parents celebrate the first day of school – complete with new clothes or uniforms and new school supplies – by taking a picture of their children. Many families include a blessing for the coming year school year and may even gift wrap the school supplies to make them more special. Other new beginnings – such as a new pet, a driver's license, a new job, and going on a trip or leaving for vacation – are excellent times for a blessing or prayer. Some families bless each room of a new house, some families do a house blessing each year on the feast of the Epiphany.

Our traditions do not *make* us holy. Rather, they celebrate and remind us of the holiness that is already there in our domestic church.
